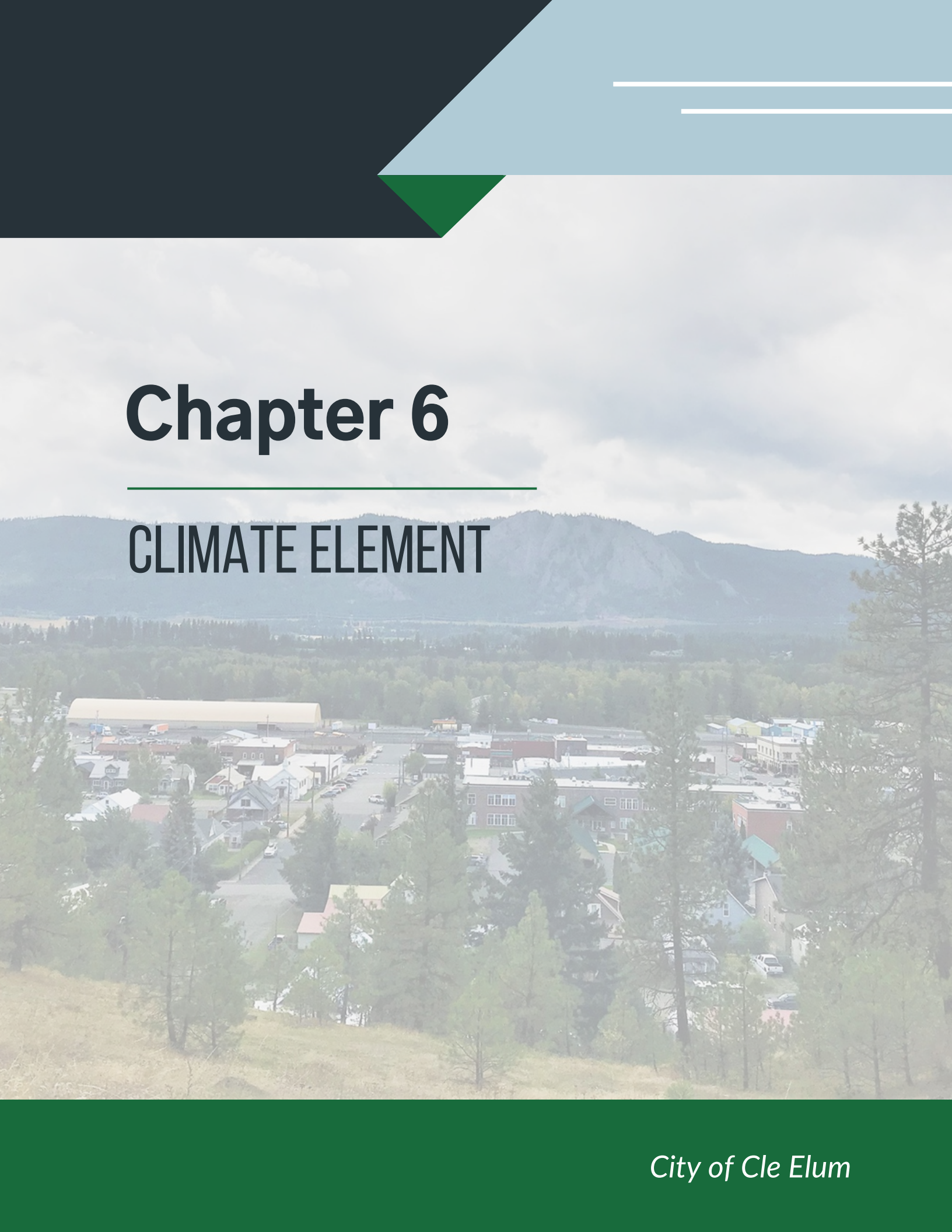

I. Introduction

The WA Legislature passed House Bill 1181 into law in 2023 which requires Washington Cities to update their Comprehensive Plan to build community resilience and reduce greenhouse gas emissions that contribute to global climate change. This law integrates climate planning into Washington’s Growth Management Act (GMA) by including the following:

- Adds a GMA climate change and resiliency goal to: “ensure that comprehensive plans, development regulations, policies, plans and strategies under RCW 36.70A.201 and chapter 47.80 RCW adapt to and mitigate the effects of a changing climate; support reductions in greenhouse gas emissions and per capita vehicle miles traveled; prepare for climate impact scenarios; foster resiliency to climate impacts and natural hazards; protect and enhance environmental, economic, and human health and safety, and enhance environmental justice.”

The WA State Department of Commerce developed an interim guidance document in December 2023 for cities to follow as they work towards implementation.

The City of Cle Elum received grant funding from Commerce in 2023, funded by Washington’s Climate Commitment Act.

A. Geography, Demographics and Equity

The City of Cle Elum has a population of 2,157 people, 7% of whom are Hispanic or Latino. The city has 1,116 households and an average household size of 2.76 persons. English is the primary language spoken at home at 93.6%, 5.6% of homes speak Spanish.

The median age in Cle Elum is 48.6. 16.1% of the population is under 18 years old and 20.9% of the population is over the age of 65.

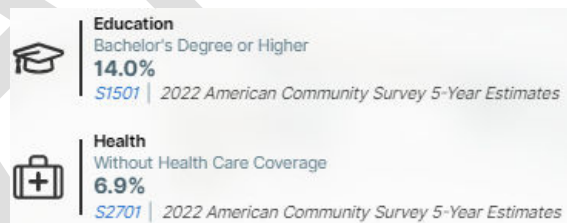


The median household income in Cle Elum is \$56,645 which is below both Kittitas County (\$66,800) and WA State (\$91,306). Approximately 14% of Cle Elum residents have a bachelor's degree or higher.

The city has a 56.5% employment rate, with the top 3 sectors being Construction (19.2%), Arts, entertainment, recreation, accommodation, and food services (17.9%), and Retail trade (12.1%).



About 59.7% of homes are owned in the city limits. The median gross rent for rental housing is \$1,116 per month.



B. Vision

The city of Cle Elum went through a robust visioning process during its 2017-2019 Comprehensive Plan Update process. The vision includes a more cohesive, pro-active community-wide strategy based on two central pillars: retaining its basic historic character as a moderate scale, rural community while at the same time transforming to a more sustainable economic base. The economic base's main focus would be the development of a vibrant, pedestrian oriented recreation service center that captures Cle Elum's strategic location and the regional trends already underway. Included in the vision is the retention and enhancement of Cle Elum's historic heritage as an "Era Town" along with strategies for destination tourism, downtown redevelopment, and the attraction of destination retail establishments.

The consensus desire is a vision that is proactive whereby the community directs and controls its own future outcome, rather than passively reacting to market forces. Issues of community enhancement and sustainability relate to economic conditions, urban form, and

related quality of life factors – all of which are interrelated. Translated, those issues must include a vision to:

- Improve the downtown’s urban form and vitality.
- Develop a cohesive strategy for economic base transformation that combines retention of the community’s cultural and historic heritage.
- Generate an economic agenda to enhance income levels.
- Increase quality local employment opportunities to reduce the need for commuting.
- Enhance facilities and employment designed to encourage the retention and attraction of younger age cohorts in balance with the growing retiree and recreation demographics of the city and region.
- Support the expansion of retail and service businesses.
- Encourage a larger population of business base to finance infrastructure improvements.
- Pursue the availability of basic and emergency health care services.

The Washington State Legislature passed House Bill 1181 into law in 2023, which requires Washington Cities to update their Comprehensive Plan to add a Climate Element. The City of Cle Elum finds that the new Climate Element is consistent with the vision statement, and wishes to add the following to its existing vision for the community:

“Proactively support goals and policies that contribute to a more sustainable and resilient city. Cle Elum recognizes its history as an Era Town and is taking steps in the present to ensure that future generations can celebrate this important cultural and historic heritage.”

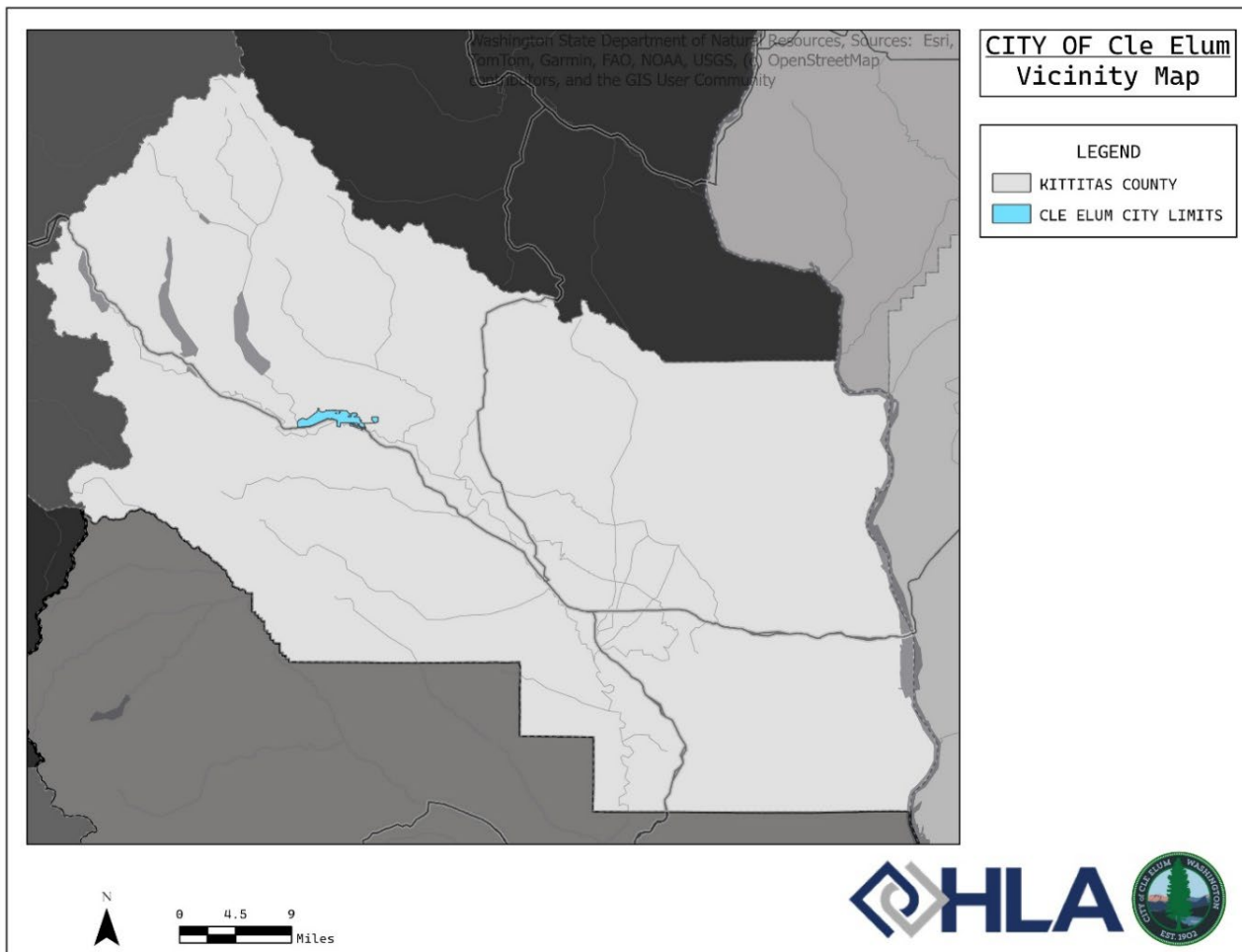


FIGURE 1-1 VICINITY MAP

II. Identified Assets, Hazards, and Threats

A. Assets

The City of Cle Elum contains a variety of sectors and assets. Sectors are defined as “Distinct categories related to human wellbeing, critical industries, or infrastructure and planning (UW Climate Mapping Tool).” Based on the 11 identified sector categories, several assets in Cle Elum were identified.

B. Hazards and Threats

The following hazards were identified by the University of Washington Climate Mapping Tool - <https://data.cig.uw.edu/climate/mapping/ington> [County Climate Projections \(uw.edu\)](https://data.cig.uw.edu/climate/mapping/ington) The mapping tool looks at possible future conditions given a set of plausible assumptions about the future. The climate projections for the various hazard types are simulated based a simulated historical period. For most categories, the changes are calculated relative to the 1980-2009 simulated historical mean. The Climate Policy Advisory Team (CPAT) ranked the hazards based on their severity to Cle Elum.

Wildfire

Wildfire activity has a direct effect on Cle Elum due to its proximity to forest lands in the Cle Elum Ranger District. Nearby wildfires can cause a direct impact and wildfire The Wildfire hazard includes two sub-categories:

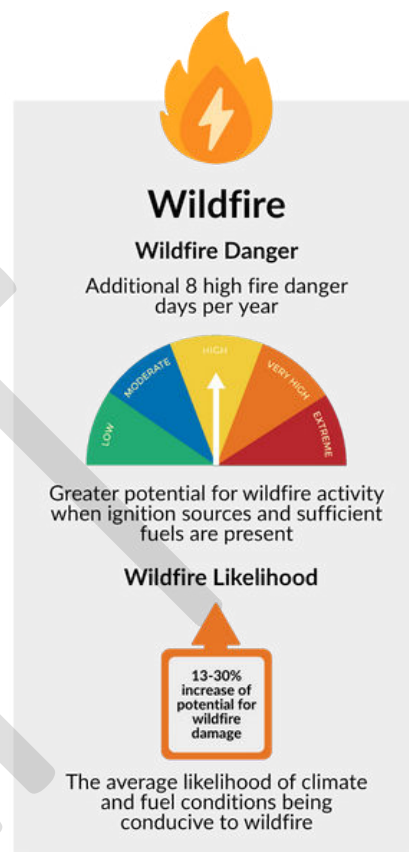
- Wildfire Danger
- Wildfire Likelihood

The vulnerability rating for wildfire around the city of Cle Elum, is “high or extreme,” according to the 2025 Kittitas County Hazard Mitigation Plan. Based on this, the vulnerability rank for Wildfire is “High”. This can affect the following assets:

- Residential, Commercial, Industrial Uses, and Buildings (Buildings & Energy)
- Transportation Infrastructure (Transportation)
- Forest, Shoreline, Wetlands, Priority Habitat, Over Steepened Slopes, Parks and Open Space (Ecosystems)
- Refuse Pickup (Waste Management)
- Water Distribution and Reservoir (Water Resources)
- Fire and Police Stations (Emergency Management)
- WA State Horse Park/Historic Buildings (Cultural Resources & Practices)

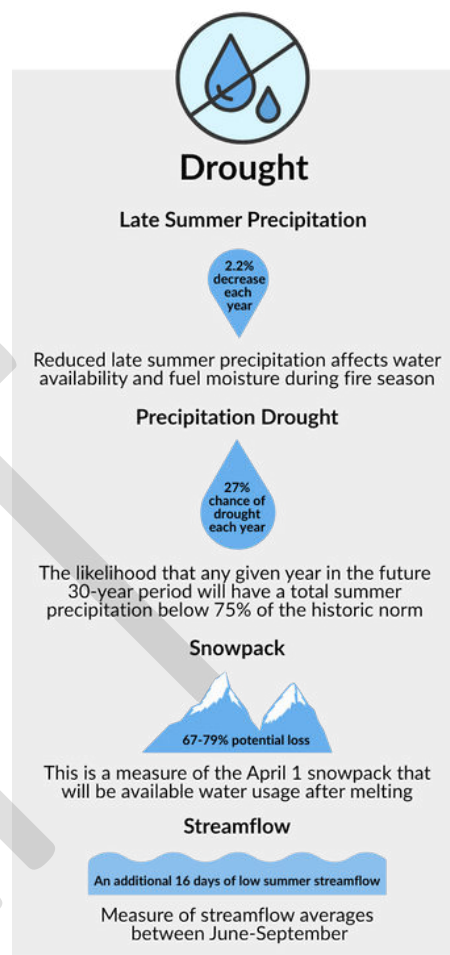

Drought

Drought looks at changes in precipitation patterns throughout the year and the subsequent effect on water supplies. The data suggests a 2.4% increase in Total Annual Precipitation and a 2.1% increase or 2.2% decrease in Late Summer Precipitation, depending on location. However, since Eastern Washington generally sees lower precipitation than Western Washington, the modest gains in precipitation are still outweighed by the Precipitation Drought estimate. The data predicts a 27% chance that Cle Elum will see any year within the planning period where the total summer precipitation is below 75% of the historic average. Snowpack has a direct relation on spring and summer streamflows. Cle Elum could see a potential 67-79% loss in snowpack during the planning period. In turn, streamflows could decrease by 10% during the warming season, increasing to 36% during summer. Cle Elum could see an additional 16 days per year below the historic low summer streamflow. The Drought hazard includes these sub-categories:

- Total Annual Precipitation
- Late Summer Precipitation
- Precipitation Drought
- Snowpack / Snowpack Drought
- Warm Season/Summer/Low Streamflow



The 2025 Kittitas County Hazard Mitigation Plan, the risk for drought in Cle Elum is moderate at 45. Based on this, the vulnerability rank for drought is medium. Drought can affect the following assets and sectors:

- Forest, Shoreline, Wetlands, Priority Habitat, Over Steepened Slopes (Ecosystems)
- Water Distribution, and Water Reservoir (Water Resources)

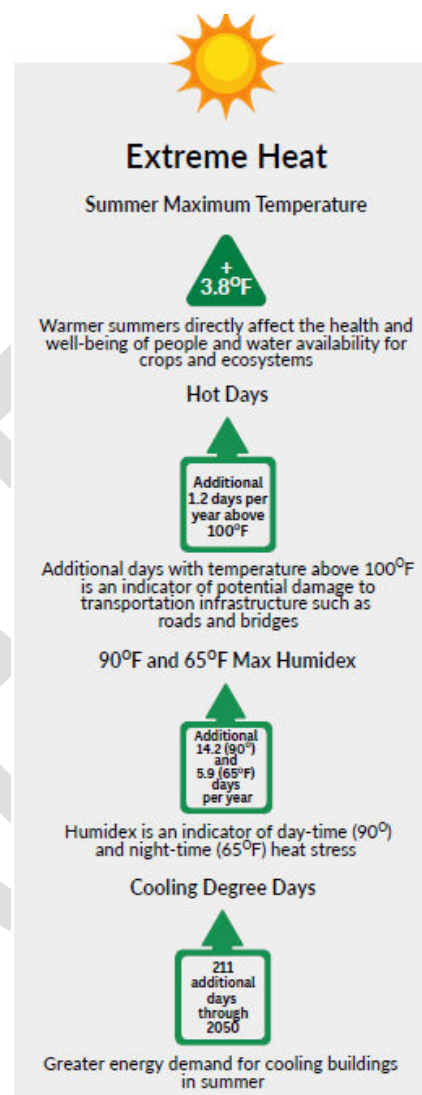
Extreme Heat

Extreme Heat is an indicator on heat stress for people, ecosystems, and infrastructure. Cle Elum is expected to see the average summer temperature increase 3.8°F, an additional 1.2-days per year above 100°F, and an additional 14-days per year above 90°F. The Extreme Heat hazard includes these sub-categories:

- Summer Maximum Temperature
- Hot Days
- 90°F Humidex Days
- 65°F Humidex Days
- Heating Degree Days
- Cooling Degree Days
- August Stream Temperature

The 2025 Kittitas County Hazard Mitigation Plan includes a moderate risk score of 42 for heat wave/extreme heat hazards. Based on this, the vulnerability rank for extreme heat in the City of Cle Elum is “Medium”. Extreme Heat can affect the following assets and sectors:

- Residential, Commercial, Industrial Uses and Buildings (Buildings & Energy)
- Local Retail and Service Establishments (Economic Development)
- Medical Practitioners (Emergency Management, Health & Well-being)
- Transportation Infrastructure (Transportation)

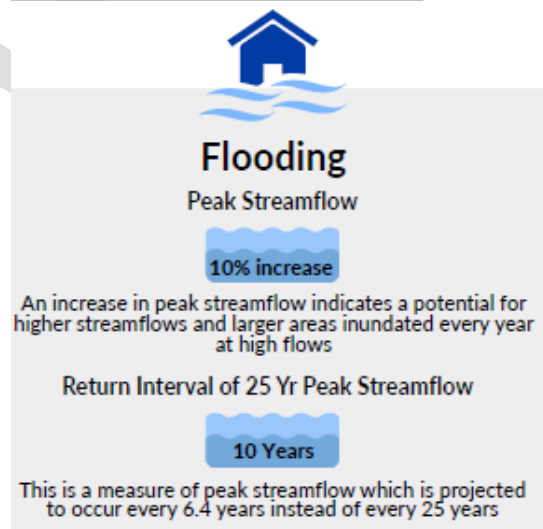
Flooding

Flooding looks at increases in annual peak streamflows and the 25-year peak streamflow. Based on the data, Cle Elum could see a 10% increase in maximum streamflow during the planning period. Increasing streamflows could result in the 25-year peak streamflow occurring every 10 years instead of every 25 years. Flooding includes the following sub-categories:

- Peak Streamflow
- Return Interval 25-yr Storm

The 2025 Kittitas County Hazard Mitigation Plan provides a significant amount of data for flooding in Cle Elum. Based on this, the vulnerability rank for flooding is “High”. Flooding can affect the following assets:

- Transportation Infrastructure
- Forest, Shoreline, Wetlands, Priority Habitat, Over Steepened Slopes (Ecosystems)
- Refuse Pickup (Waste Management)
- Local Retail and Service Establishments (Economic Development)

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Higher streamflows are expected to increase damage to all types of infrastructure in flood zones and could expand the flood zone in some areas leading to damage of development not currently in flood zones.	Peak Streamflow	Zoning and Development

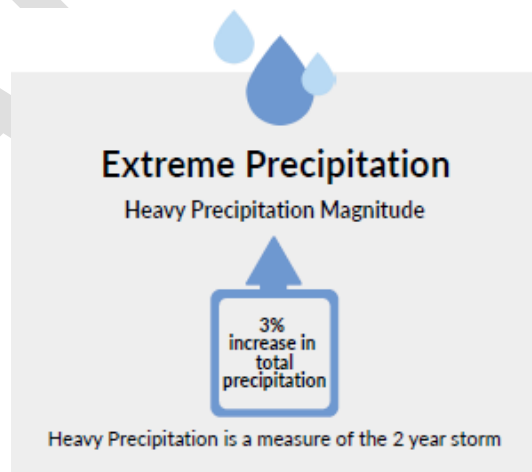
Extreme Precipitation

Extreme Precipitation looks at changes in the intensity of precipitation and the effects on the built environment. The Extreme Precipitation hazard includes two sub-categories:

- Heavy Precipitation Magnitude
- Extreme Precipitation Magnitude

The 2025 Kittitas County Mitigation Plan Provides a significant amount of data for precipitation in Cle Elum. Based on this, the vulnerability rank for extreme precipitation is “low”, however, extreme precipitation can affect the following asset:

- Refuse Pickup (Waste Management)
- Transportation Infrastructure

III. Resiliency Subelement

The resiliency sub-element is intended to identify ways that Cle Elum can adapt and become more responsive to potential changes in the climate. RCW 70A.65.010 defines Climate Resilience as

“The ongoing process of anticipating, preparing for, and adapting to changes in climate and minimizing negative impacts to our natural systems, infrastructure, and communities.”

What this means for Cle Elum is determining what potential policy changes can be incorporated to help the city deal with projected hazards such as more frequent wildfires, longer heat waves, more frequent drought, and stronger storms. It is an analysis of community preparedness, response, and recovery efforts.

This resiliency sub-element will identify goals and policies that Cle Elum may pursue during the Comprehensive Plan planning cycle to improve resiliency to projected climate impacts. In accordance with RCW 36.70A.070(9), the sub-element must prioritize actions that benefit overburdened communities that will disproportionately suffer from compounding environmental impacts and will be the most impacted by natural hazards due to climate change. Specific goals, policies, and programs of the resiliency sub-element must include, but are not limited to, those designed to:

1. Identify, protect, and enhance natural areas to foster resiliency to climate impacts, as well as areas of vital habitat for safe passage and species migration;
2. Identify, protect, and enhance community resiliency to climate change impacts, including social, economic, and built environment factors, that support adaptation to climate impacts consistent with environmental justice; and
3. Address natural hazards created or aggravated by climate change.

A. Goals and Policies

The purpose of establishing goals and policies is to provide an implementation framework to meet the City’s vision and state requirements for the Climate Resiliency Element. Goals

provide a general statement or broad concept of the desired outcome. Policies then include a set protocol or proposal designed to achieve the stated Goal.

To achieve this, Cle Elum decided to pursue a combination of Pathway 1 and Pathway 2 by identifying existing goals and policies to incorporate by reference or modify along with developing new goals and policies with the help of the Climate Policy Explorer. By combining the two pathways, Cle Elum is acknowledging the existing climate-related work that has already been adopted into its plans and policies.

Step 5 – Integrate Goals & Policies



New Goals and Policies

The following goals and policies are adapted from the Washington State Department of Commerce’s “Climate Policy Explorer.”

Goal CE-1 Develop a comprehensive, communitywide wildfire resilience strategy to improve emergency response capabilities, create fire resilient landscapes, promote fire adapted communities, protect the economy, and foster short- and long-term recovery.

Policies:

- CE-1.1** Support the development of a city-focused community wildfire protection plan (CWPP)
- CE-1.2** Create evacuation plans and outreach materials to help residents plan and practice actions that make evacuation quicker and safer.
- CE-1.3** Provide private forestland owners and residents living in Wildland-Urban (WUI) areas information about fire prevention (e.g. Firewise) practices, and support application of such practices via building code provisions.
- CE-1.4** Map transportation infrastructure that is vulnerable to repeated floods, landslides, and other natural hazards, and designate alternative travel routes for critical transportation corridors when roads must be closed.

CE-1.5 Analyze how the municipal water system maintains adequate pressure during a major wildfire event (e.g. multiple structures burning) and how it will look under current and projected drought conditions.

Goal CE-2 Adopt fire-resilience standards for new and redeveloped sites in high-risk wildfire areas.

Policies:

CE-2.1 Identify and implement strategies for reducing residential development pressure in the wildland-urban interface (WUI).

CE-2.2 Require new subdivisions to bury electricity transmission lines and associated infrastructure to reduce damage from storms and wildfire ignition risks.

CE-2.3 Support local businesses' efforts to bolster climate preparedness and continuity of operations.

Goal CE-3 **Ensure that the local transportation system – including infrastructure, routes, and travel modes – is able to withstand and recover quickly from the impacts of extreme weather events and other hazards exacerbated by climate change.**

Policies:

CE-3.1 Improve street connectivity and walkability; including sidewalks and street crossings, to serve as potential evacuation routes.

Goal CE-4 **Develop and implement a comprehensive drought resilience strategy for different drought stages.**

Policies:

CE-4.1 Manage water resources sustainability in the face of climate change through smart irrigation, stormwater management, preventative maintenance, water conservation, wastewater reuse, plant selection, and landscape management.

CE-4.2 Construct and maintain new water-storage systems (e.g. large cisterns, water towers, ad reservoirs) to provide back-up water supplies during droughts and support climate resilience.

- CE-4.3** Support the use of green infrastructure and low-impact development to address increased storm intensities and stormwater runoff.
- CE-4.4** Choose native drought- and pest- resistant trees, shrubs, and grasses in restoration efforts to support climate resilience.
- CE-4.5** Analyze how the municipal water system maintains adequate pressure during a major wildfire event (e.g., multiple structures burning) and how it will look under current and projected drought conditions.

Goal CE-5 Consider a program/identify funding sources to install cooling systems and heat pumps, and upgrade insulation and windows/doors; prioritizing households with residents most vulnerable to extreme temperature events.

Policies:

- CE-5.1** Develop or modify design standards to integrate exterior building features that reduce the impacts of climate change and increase resilience.
- CE-6** Establish regulations that incorporate best practices for reducing the risk of wildfire, extreme heat, flooding, and other climate-exacerbated hazards.
- CE-6.1** Consider overlays, special zoning districts, design standards, or other strategies to increase resilience to climate hazards.

Goal CE-7 Ensure the protection and restoration of streams, riparian zones, estuaries, wetlands, and floodplains to achieve healthy watersheds that are resilient to climate change.

Policies:

- CE-7.1** Promote the restoration of floodplains and connectivity to improve the resilience of streams and rivers and reduce flood risk.

Goal CE-8 Require the design and construction of commercial and residential buildings and their surrounding sites to reduce and treat stormwater runoff and pollution.

Policies:

- CE-8.1** Reduce stormwater impacts from transportation and development through watershed planning, redevelopment and retrofit projects, and low-impact development.

Incorporation of Existing Goals and Policies

The following existing goals and policies are found within various sections of the Cle Elum Comprehensive Plan and are incorporated herein by reference.

Land Use Element:

- Policy LU 6.1: Discourage the disturbance of vegetation when not in conjunction with the actual development, except to incorporate firewise principles.
- Policy LU 6.3: Lands designated for open space should be designed with Firewise practices in mind, and provides for multiple open space benefits whenever possible, including active or passive recreation opportunities, scenic amenities, fish and wildlife habitat, etc.
- Policy LU 6.4: Provide incentives for owners of public and private property to preserve open space as a visual amenity and Firewise strategy through techniques such as defensible space, conservation easements, transfer of development rights and density bonuses to encourage clustering.

Capital Facilities Element:

- Policy CF 3.7: Development proposals within the city should incorporate construction designs including, but not limited to, gray/green infrastructure, alternative energy sources (solar, wind, etc.), and resilient building materials which minimize water and energy consumption.

Housing Element:

- Policy H 5.1: Consistently enforce building maintenance, health and safety codes for the city's housing stock to limit the potential damage resulting from wildfires or other extreme weather events.
- Policy H 5.2: Encourage programs that offer assistance with renovations and home improvements including those that will help efficiency for wildfire smoke and extreme heat, and maintenance efforts such as creating defensible space so that residents can stay in their homes even when their housing needs change.

Parks and Recreation Element:

- Goal PRO-5: Establish an open space pattern that will provide definition of and separation between developed lands to establish defensible space buffers and provide open space linkages among parks and recreation resources.

- Policy PRO-10.1: Furnish trail systems with appropriate improvements including: directory and interpretive signage; rest stops; shade structures; drinking fountains; restrooms; emergency call boxes; and other services.

In addition to the Comprehensive Plan, the City of Cle Elum also adopted the 2025 Kittitas County Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan on September 23, 2025 (Resolution 2025-019). Incorporated by reference are the following goals, objectives and mitigation actions:

Goal 1: Protect life, property and the environment.

- Objective 1.A: Reduce natural hazard-related risks and vulnerability to populations, critical facilities and infrastructure within the planning area.
- Objective 1.B: Establish a partnership among all levels of government and the business community to improve and implement methods to protect property.
- Objective 1.C: Encourage hazard mitigation measures that result in the least adverse effect on the natural environment and the use or natural processes.
- Objective 1.D: Identify and implement inclusive actions that reduce vulnerability for Kittitas County residents and visitors.

Goal 2: Continuously build and support local capacity to mitigate, prepare for, respond to and recover from the impact of hazards and disasters.

- Objective 2.A: Minimize the impacts of natural hazards on current and future land uses by encouraging use of incentives for hazard mitigation (i.e. NFIP, CRS).
- Objective 2.B: Prevent (or discourage) new development in hazardous areas or ensure that if building occurs in high-risk areas that it is done in such a way as to minimize risk.

Goal 3: Establish a hazard and disaster resilient economy.

- Objective 3.A: Update the plan annually to integrate local hazard mitigation plans and the results of disaster- and hazard-specific planning efforts.
- Objective 3.B: Use the best available data, science and technologies to improve understanding of the location and potential impacts of natural hazards, the vulnerability of building types, and community development patterns and the measures needed to protect life safety.
- Objective 3.C: Review new and existing policies to determine where climate change resiliency strategies can be included.

Goal 4: Promote public awareness, engage public participation and enhance partnerships through education and outreach.

- Objective 4.A: Educate the public on the risk exposure to natural hazards and ways to increase the public's capacity to prepare, respond, recover and mitigate the impacts of these events.
- Objective 4.B: Encourage home and business owners to obtain and maintain flood insurance through the NFIP or other insurance providers.

Goal 5: Encourage the development and implementation of long-term, cost-effective mitigation projects.

Objective 5.A: Integrate hazard mitigation policies into land use plans within the planning area.

Objective 5.B: Retrofit, purchase, or relocate structures in high hazard areas including those known to be repetitively damaged.

Mitigation Action 1: Consider participation in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) Community Rating System (CRS) program

Mitigation Action 2: Adopt appropriate regulatory standards that will reduce the risk of natural hazards through updates of existing code affecting critical areas regulations, flood hazard regulations, shoreline regulations, and updates City's Comprehensive Plan

Mitigation Action 3: Repair, design, implement permitting, and construct left bank of the Yakima River adjacent to Interstate 90 and Hanson Ponds.

Mitigation Action 4: Maintain compliance and good standing under the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP).

Mitigation Action 5: Consider participation in the National Weather Service "StormReady" Program.

Mitigation Action 6: Where appropriate, support retrofitting, purchase, or relocation of structures in hazard-prone areas to protect structures from future damage, with properties with exposure to repetitive losses as a priority.

Mitigation Action 7: Support and maintain participation in the Firewise Program by expanding the number of project sites within the City of Cle Elum and promoting Firewise strategies through active community outreach.

Mitigation Action 8: Develop and implement a Continuity of Operation Plan (COOP) and/or Post-Disaster Recovery Plan to ensure critical City functions remain operational after an incident or disaster.

Mitigation Action 9: Conduct public outreach on natural hazards, their risks, and alternatives to reduce risks and impacts through existing public outreach programs in the City of Cle Elum.

- Mitigation Action 10: Support the implementation, monitoring, maintenance, and updating of the Kittitas County Hazard Mitigation Plan, as outlined in Volume 1 (Countywide Planning Elements).
- Mitigation Action 11: Support, through active participation, the Countywide initiatives identified in Volume 1 (Countywide Planning Elements) of the Kittitas County Hazard Mitigation Plan.
- Mitigation Action 12: Implement fuels reduction strategies and vegetation maintenance to reduce wildfire vulnerability and impacts in the Wildland Urban Interface across all property ownerships.
- Mitigation Action 13: Provide emergency power for all City critical facilities and infrastructure.
- Mitigation Action 14: Elevate the Cle Elum River backup wellfield controls to protect the back-up water sources.
- Mitigation Action 15: Implement alternative methods and strategies to provide sustainable vegetation and debris removal in the Wildland Urban Interface by incorporating equipment to better dispose and reuse material (i.e., Tub Grinders). Sustainable processing of vegetation and organic matter can ultimately lead to new opportunities for biomass energy utilization and material needed for restoration.

IV. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

A. Introduction

Early and continuous public engagement is an important component of any long-range planning effort. The purpose of public participation is to reach a diverse population in equitable and meaningful ways. Through public participation, the city hopes to better understand how the effects of climate change are felt throughout the community.

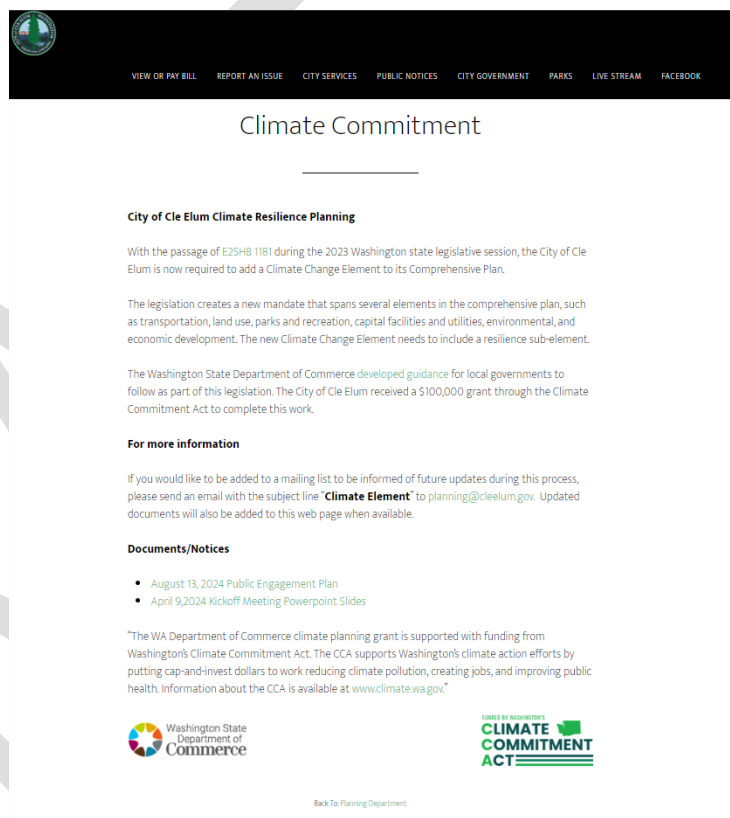
B. Project Webpage

The city established a project webpage to disseminate information. The webpage was updated throughout the project as new documents were made available.

C. Climate Policy Advisory Team

Creating and seating members onto a Climate Policy Advisory Team (CPAT) is the first step toward the creation of a new Climate Element. Policy team member responsibilities will include:

- Advising staff on project priorities;
- Sharing a broad range of perspectives to inform the plan;
- Assist with development of the public participation plan and vision statement;
- Reviewing and providing feedback on key project deliverables;
- Developing goal and policy recommendations through a consensus-based approach; and,
- Encouraging community members to participate in the public process.

The CPAT met through the duration of the project and was instrumental in developing key documents for public review.

CPAT Meeting 1 – June 17, 2024

The first meeting of the CPAT included introductions, a review of the purpose of the Climate Element and relevant task outlines for the team. Drafts of the Vision Statement and Public Engagement Plan were presented for CPAT review at the next meeting.

CPAT Meeting 2 – July 22, 2024

The bulk of meeting 2 was spent reviewing hazards identified by the UW Climate Mapping Tool. After review, the CPAT ranked the hazards and sectors by their severity to Cle Elum. The Public Engagement Plan was also finalized and recommended for Council approval.

CPAT Meeting 3 – August 21, 2024

Meeting 3 consisted of reviewing and finalizing documents and the strategy for the scheduled September 24, 2024 meetings at the Senior Center and City Council. The CPAT acknowledges that the public has generally not been receptive to discussing climate-related issues, and so an FAQ document was developed to help answer any pressing questions the community may have.

CPAT Meeting 4 – October 21, 2024

In meeting 4, the CPAT looked at asset-hazard pairs in the Climate Element Workbook and reviewed them based on identified climate indicators.

CPAT Meeting 5 – December 2, 2024

Meeting 5 included an introduction to the city's vulnerability assessment. Discussion included an initial review of the vulnerability assessment pages in the Climate Element Workbook.

CPAT Meeting 6 – January 13, 2025

During meeting 6, the final results of the vulnerability assessment were reviewed. All asset-hazard pairs considered during the vulnerability assessment are recommended for action. The CPAT also discussed draft goals and policies and scheduling for the March 11, 2025 open house.

CPAT Meeting 7 – October 20, 2025

Meeting 7 included a recap of the remaining work completed during the 23-25 grant cycle, which ended on June 30, 2025. The CPAT did not meet after the March 11, 2025 open house as the remaining grant funding and timing was used to finalize those grant requirements and prepare materials for the 25-27 grant. The CPAT reviewed updated exhibit maps created in GIS and finalized a draft survey for public issuance.

CPAT Survey Results – March 31, 2026

CPAT members were provided full survey results and a summary via email on March 31, 2026.

CPAT Meeting 8 – August XX, 2026

For its final meeting, the CPAT reviewed and discussed the draft Climate Element and reviewed the final adoption timeline. After review, the CPAT recommended approval of the Climate Element, which will be presented to Planning Commission and Council for final recommendation and adoption.

D. Public survey

An online survey was available during November 2025. The survey was promoted on Social Media and sent as a flyer with utility bills. In total, 183 responses were provided.

Highest concerns included:

- Impacts from Wildfire and Drought
- Loss of Life and Property
- Limited Water Availability and Lower Water Quality
- Ingress and Egress during an event
- Insurance Costs Rising and Property Values Decreasing

E. Public Meetings

The city planned for a wide variety of public and stakeholder engagement opportunities throughout this process. A Public Engagement Plan (PEP) was approved by the City Council on August 13, 2024. Members of the public were invited to submit written comment about the Climate Element via email or through an online application form on the city webpage. A total of four public meetings are scheduled, in addition to the final adoption at City Council, as follows:

Meeting 1 – Project kickoff

The project kickoff meeting was held on April 9, 2024, at the City Council Business Meeting. A rough outline will be presented including some background information, formation of the CPAT, the importance of meaningful public engagement, necessary steps to complete the Climate Element, and the project timeline. Interested stakeholders are encouraged to

attend the kickoff meeting to discuss next steps and provide contact information so they can be informed about key timelines and deliverables.

Meeting 2 – Showcase data exhibits

Meeting 2 was scheduled for September 24, 2024, at the Senior Center. Despite the efforts of two CPAT members to invite people from the Senior Center to attend, there were no members of the public who participated. In preparation for this meeting, a powerpoint presentation, FAQ, and informational posterboards were developed. These documents were uploaded to the project webpage.

Also on September 24, 2024, a progress update and summary of identified hazards was provided to City Council. The meeting provided an update of progress completed, including the seating of the CPAT and adoption of the Public Engagement Plan. A summary of the ranked climate hazards was also provided, including a timeline for next steps.

Meeting 3 – Review planning process and present new goals and policies

Meeting 3 was held on March 11, 2025, at the Senior Center. In addition to the project consultant and three CPAT members, three additional members of the public were present. The meeting focused on a review of the draft goals and policies.

Meeting 4 – Present draft Climate Element and receive final public comment – Planning Commission

The final scheduled public meeting is where the draft Climate Element will be presented to the Planning Commission. The draft will include a summary of the previous public engagement meetings along with a list of all comments received. This will be the final meeting to submit public comments prior to presentation of the Climate Element to City Council for adoption.

Final adoption

Once all public comments have been received and implemented into the draft Climate Element, it will be presented to City Council for adoption at an open public meeting.

A. Equity Analysis

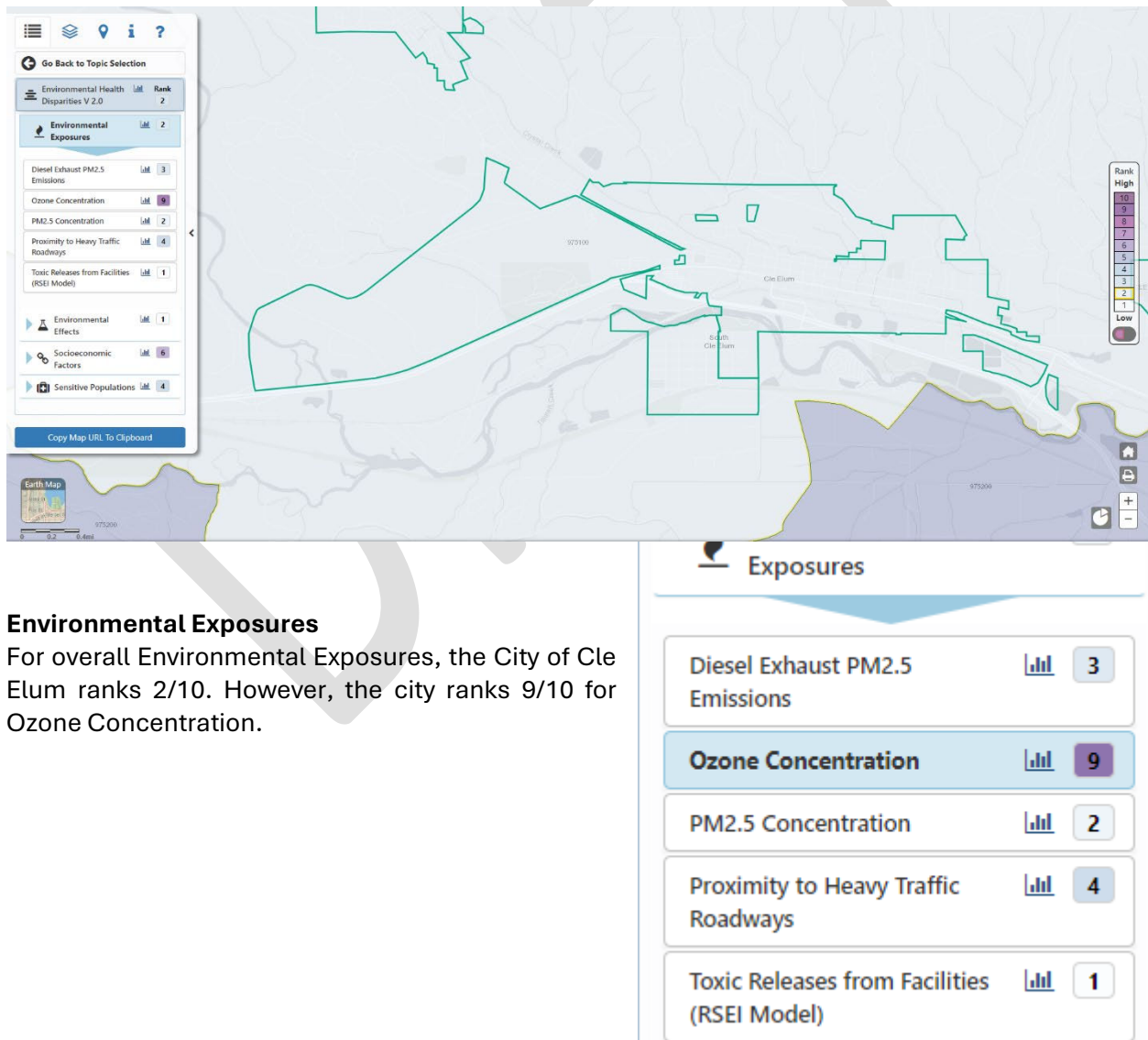
WA State Department of Health

Environmental Health Disparities

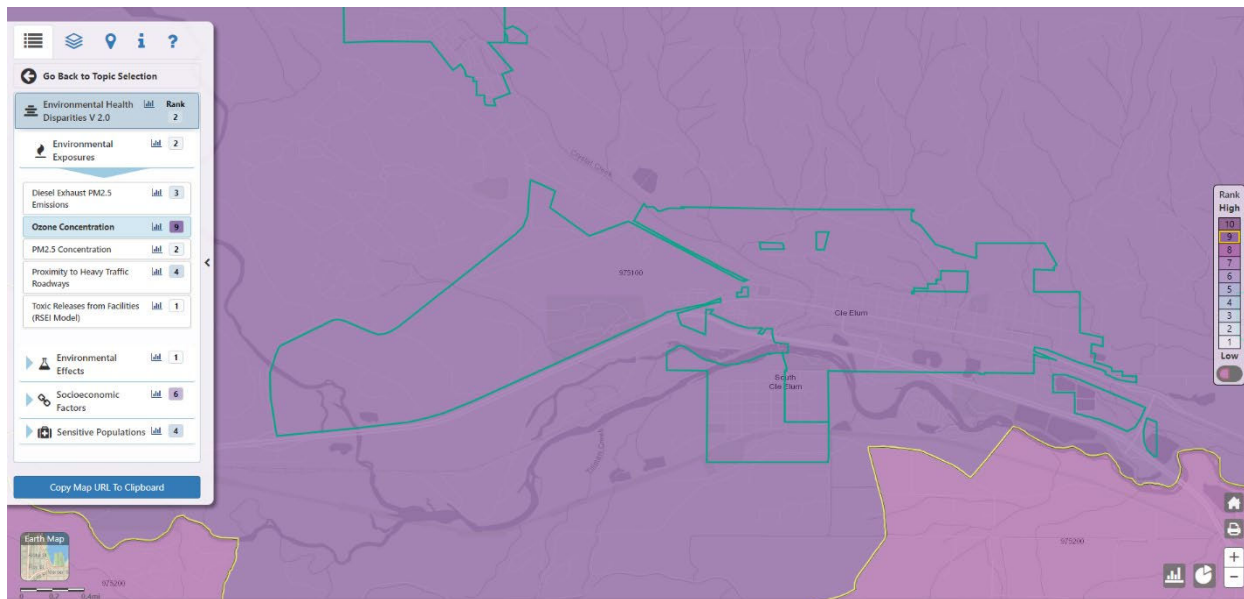
Overall, the City of Cle Elum ranks 2/10 for Environmental Health Disparities.



Environmental Exposures

For overall Environmental Exposures, the City of Cle Elum ranks 2/10. However, the city ranks 9/10 for Ozone Concentration.

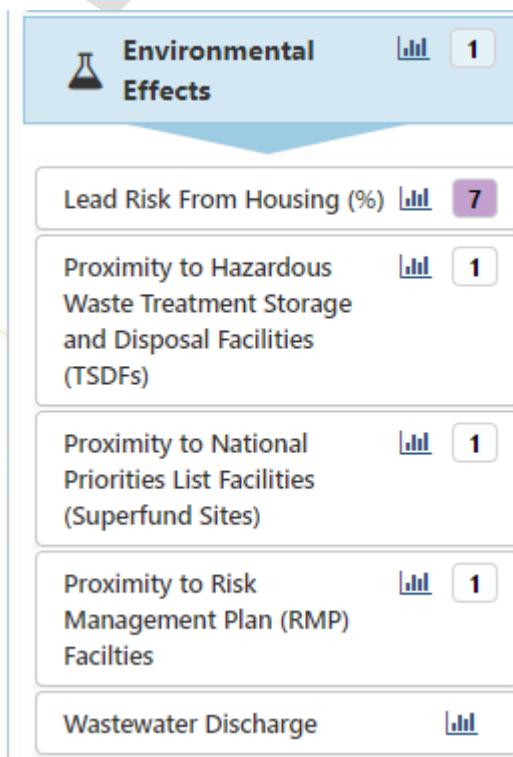
Ozone Concentration: Ozone is a highly reactive gas consisting of oxygen atoms. Sources include motor vehicles, biogenic sources, solvent use, residential wood combustion, gasoline pumps, and industrial sources. Exposure to ozone pollution can result in adverse health outcomes including increased risk of mortality. Health risks include higher rates of asthma, increased daily deaths, and increased cardiovascular and respiratory mortality.

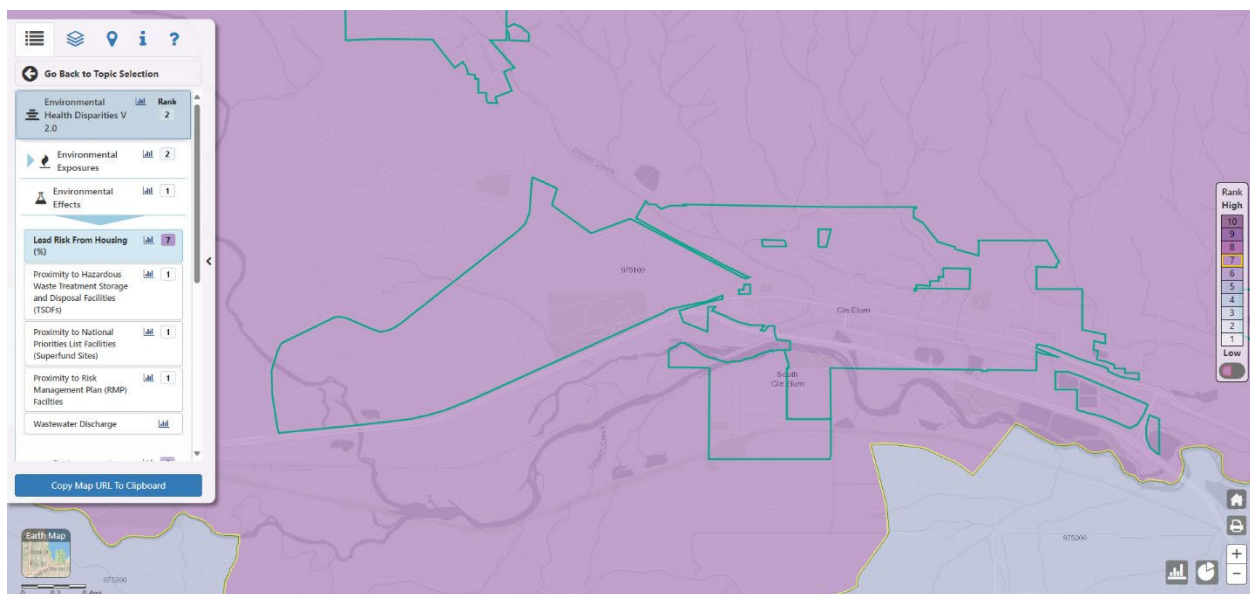


Environmental Effects

The City of Cle Elum ranks 1/10 for Environmental Effects. However, the city ranks 7/10 for Lead Risk from Housing.

Lead Risk From Housing: Lead poisoning is a serious but preventable public health issue. Lead is a naturally-occurring toxic heavy metal. Much of the lead found in human environments is due to the use of lead in products such as gasoline and house paint. There are no known safe levels of lead exposure, and even small amounts can lead to significant health implications. Exposure can lead to chronic health conditions, neurological defects, and nervous system damage. Those that live in low socioeconomic housing or in poverty are more likely to live in older homes and be exposed to lead poisoning.



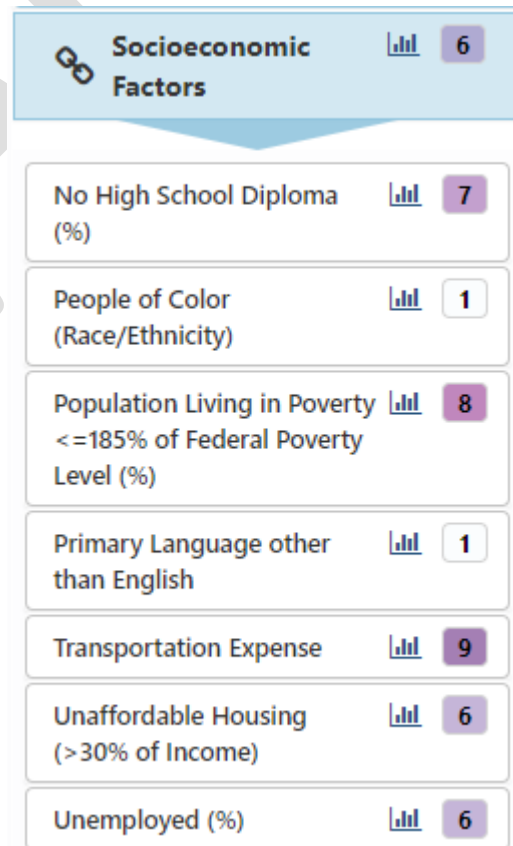


Socioeconomic Factors

The City of Cle Elum ranks 6/10 for Socioeconomic Factors, including: No High School Diploma (7/10), Population Living in Poverty (8/10), and Transportation Expense (9/10), Unaffordable Housing (6/10) and Unemployed (6/10).

No High School Diploma: Educational attainment is a very important social determinant of health as it provides insight into individual and community health and well-being for various health outcomes. Those who have a high school diploma or higher have less risk of mortality caused by particulate matter pollution. Communities with lower educational attainment are more susceptible to developing asthma and other air pollution-related cardiopulmonary health outcomes.

Population Living in Poverty: Poverty is a primary social determinant of health and is strongly associated with exposure to environmental pollutants. Low-income communities are significantly impacted by their socioeconomic status. Economic status shapes one's nutrition, occupation, housing, access to healthcare resources, and more. Due to increased psychosocial stress and decreased resilience, individuals experiencing poverty bear poor mental and physical health. Furthermore, many do not have the resources or access to healthcare services or delay healthcare due to financial insecurity. Thus, underlying pre-existing health conditions in low income communities may be exacerbated by exposure to environmental pollutants. Individuals in low



socioeconomic status face higher concentrations of air pollutants, making them more susceptible to chronic respiratory health outcomes such as asthma. In addition, those experiencing poverty may not have access to safe or healthy living conditions, leading to additional vulnerability to infectious diseases and exposure to environmental hazards.

Transportation Expense: Transportation affordability captures many of the socioeconomic conditions that affect social health and well-being. As a social determinant of health, this indicator may influence the effect of exposure to environmental pollution. Those that experience a transportation burden may be at a greater risk of living in areas of environmental degradation and increased levels of air pollution. Individuals living in areas of heavy traffic and limited transportation options may be exposed to a greater extent of air pollution and experience vulnerability to respiratory health outcomes and increased mortality. Additionally, those that experience transportation burdens may delay medical care and services and suffer more long-term impacts due to financial insecurity or distance to resources. Low-income and financially vulnerable individuals may also experience greater periods of instability, resulting in increased vulnerability to chronic and acute health conditions. Such health effects include stress and depression.

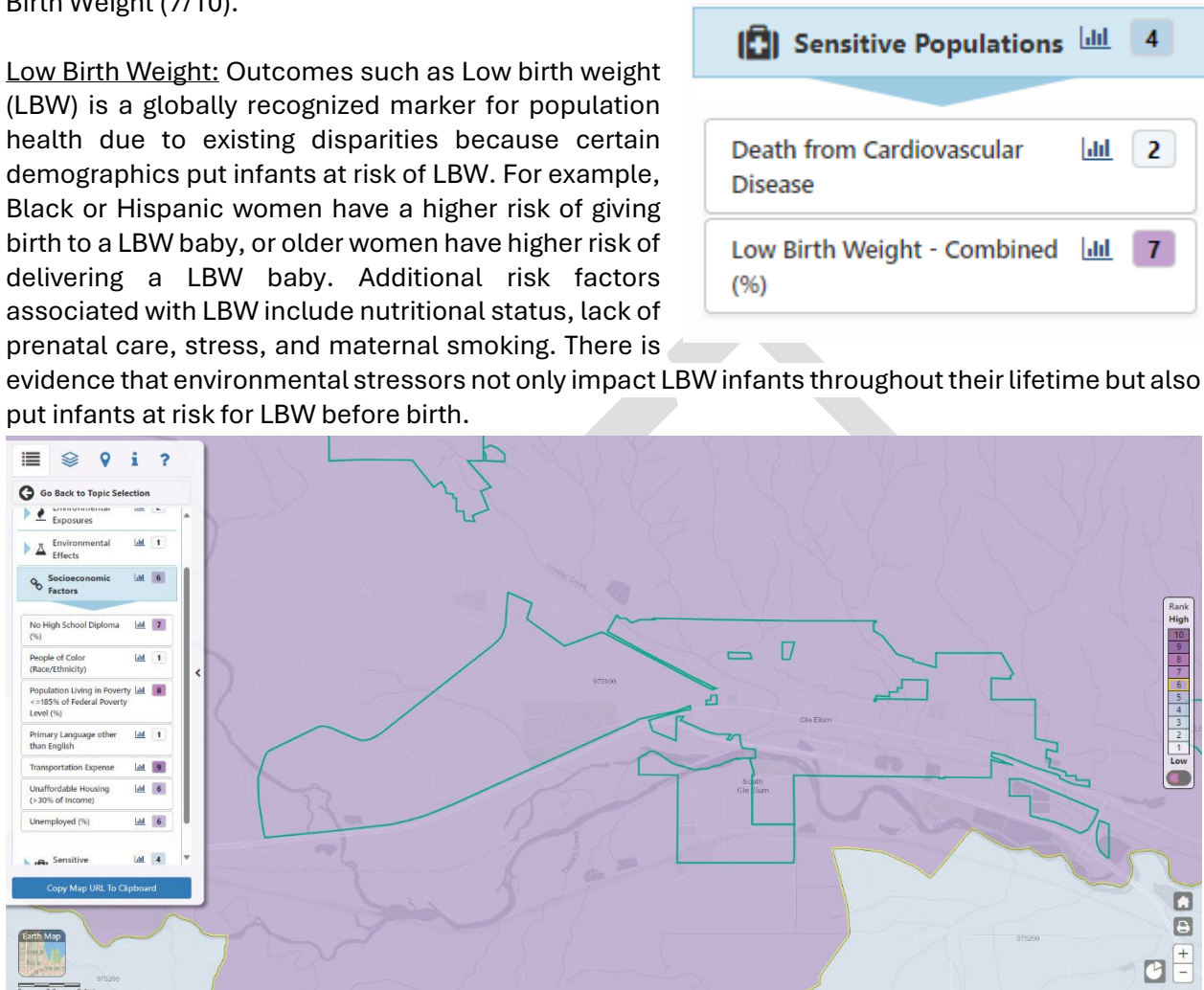
Unaffordable Housing: The housing burden captures many of the socioeconomic conditions that affect social health and well-being. As a social determinant of health, this indicator may influence the effect of exposure to environmental pollution. Those that live with a housing burden may be at a greater risk of living in areas of environmental degradation and increased levels of air pollution. Individuals experiencing a housing burden are at greater risk of exposure to air pollution and higher mortality. Those that experience a housing burden may delay medical care services and suffer more long-term impacts due to financial insecurity. Low-income and financially vulnerable households may also experience greater periods of residential instability, and increased vulnerability to chronic and acute health conditions. Such health effects include stress and depression.

Unemployed: Unemployment is a major factor when considering individual health and well-being. Unemployment can significantly impact mental and physical health as financial and emotional stress increases. This stress may lead to an increased susceptibility to environmental pollutants. With unemployment, individuals may experience the burden of financial strain, resulting in reduced access to healthcare resources, insurance, and nutritious food, leading to an increased risk of poor health outcomes related to environmental pollutants. When experiencing unemployment, individuals experience high levels of biological stress and long-term unemployment may lead to increased morbidity and mortality. Unemployment may lead individuals to seek housing in lower-income areas, which are often associated with higher levels of air pollution and environmental decline. In addition, in communities with high rates of unemployment, the increased cardiovascular disease persists.

Sensitive Populations

The City of Cle Elum ranks 4/10 for Sensitive Populations. This health disparity metric looks at Low Birth Weight (7/10).

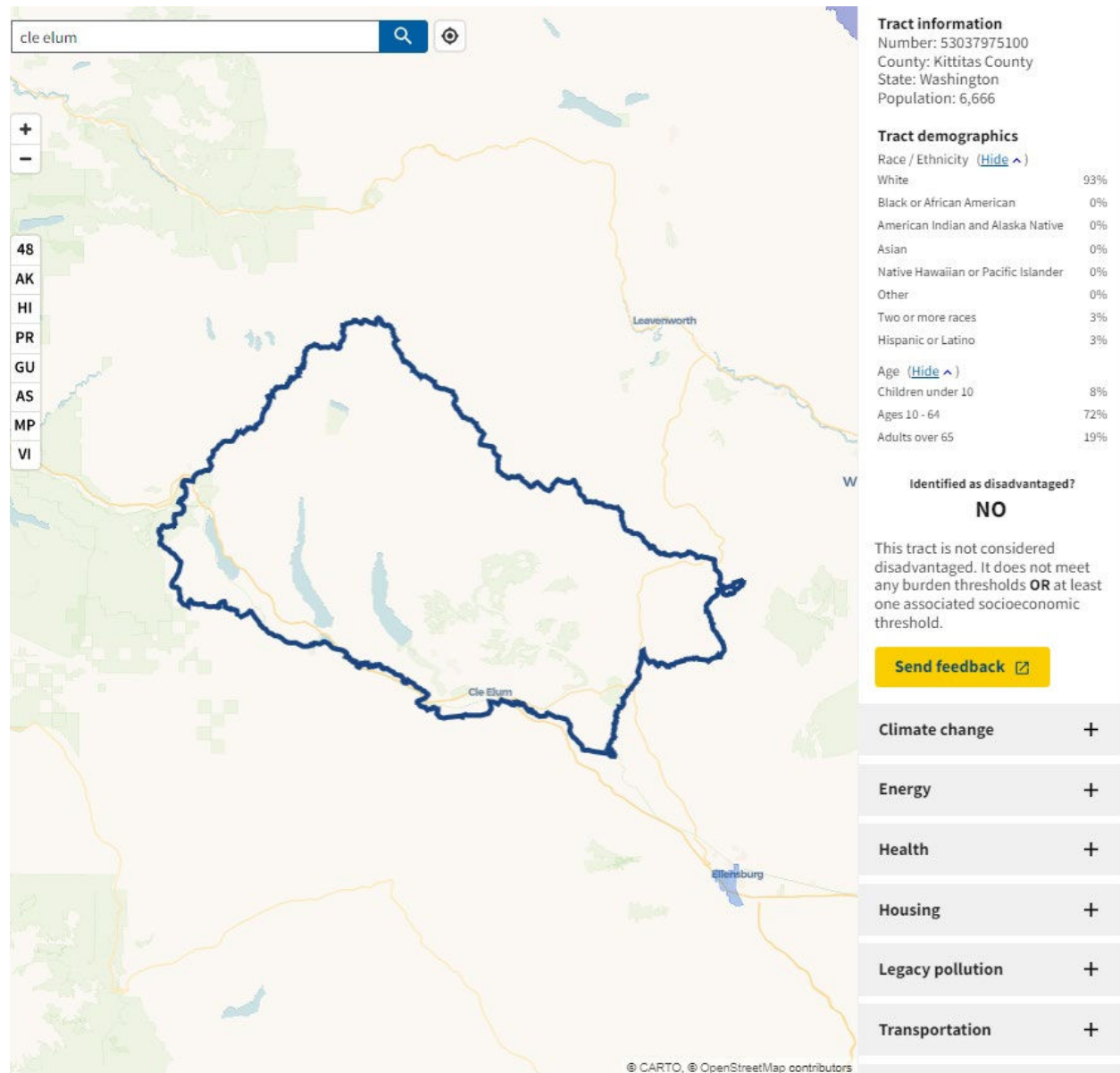
Low Birth Weight: Outcomes such as Low birth weight (LBW) is a globally recognized marker for population health due to existing disparities because certain demographics put infants at risk of LBW. For example, Black or Hispanic women have a higher risk of giving birth to a LBW baby, or older women have higher risk of delivering a LBW baby. Additional risk factors associated with LBW include nutritional status, lack of prenatal care, stress, and maternal smoking. There is evidence that environmental stressors not only impact LBW infants throughout their lifetime but also put infants at risk for LBW before birth.



Climate and Economic Justice Screening Tool

The White House Council on Environmental Quality developed a Climate and Economic Justice Screening Tool that examines overburdened and underserved areas at the census tract level. Cle Elum is located in Census Tract 530379-75100, which is not identified as disadvantaged.

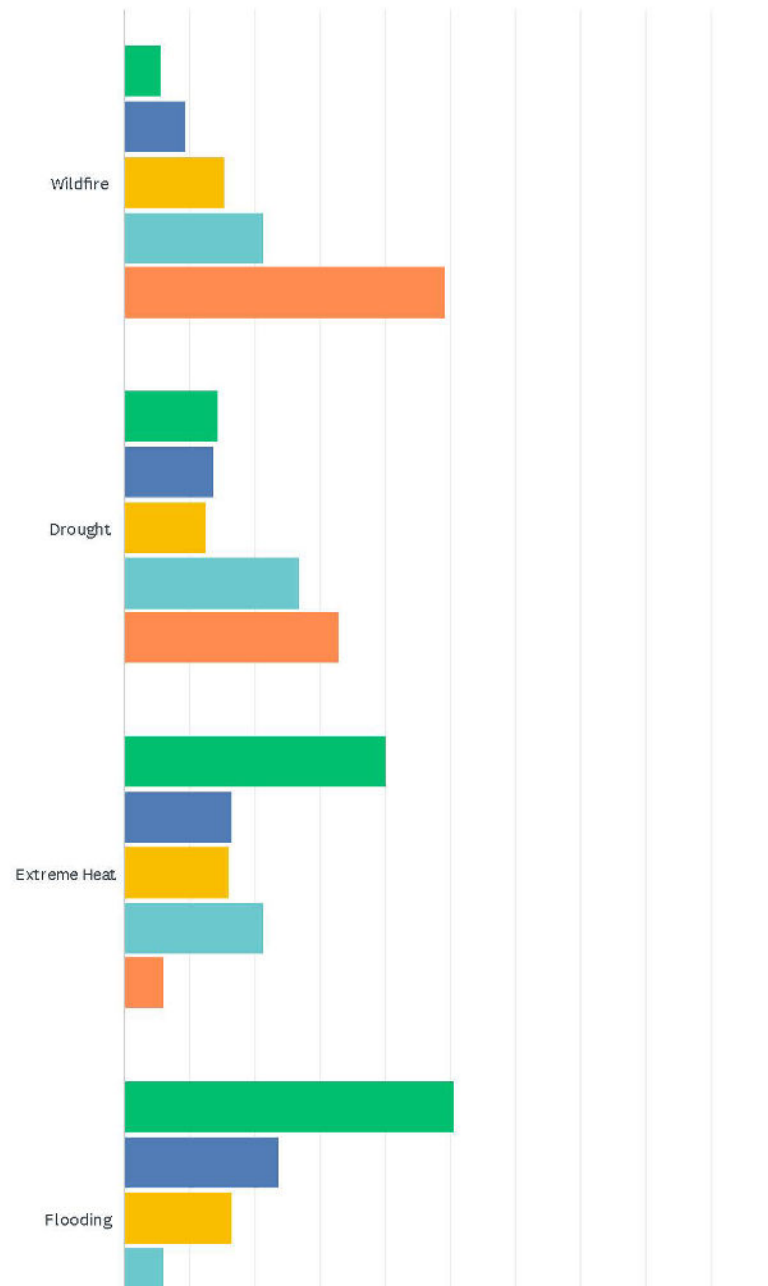

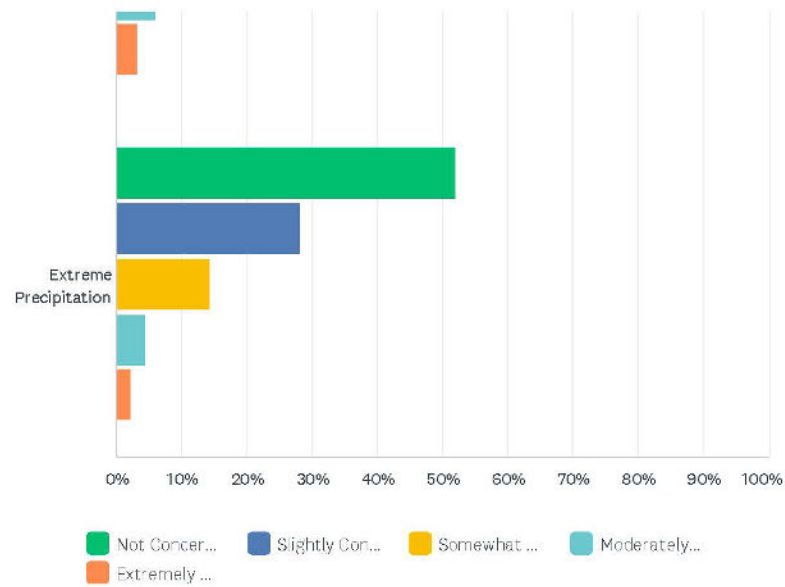
Q1 How concerned are you about the impact of each hazard in Cle Elum?

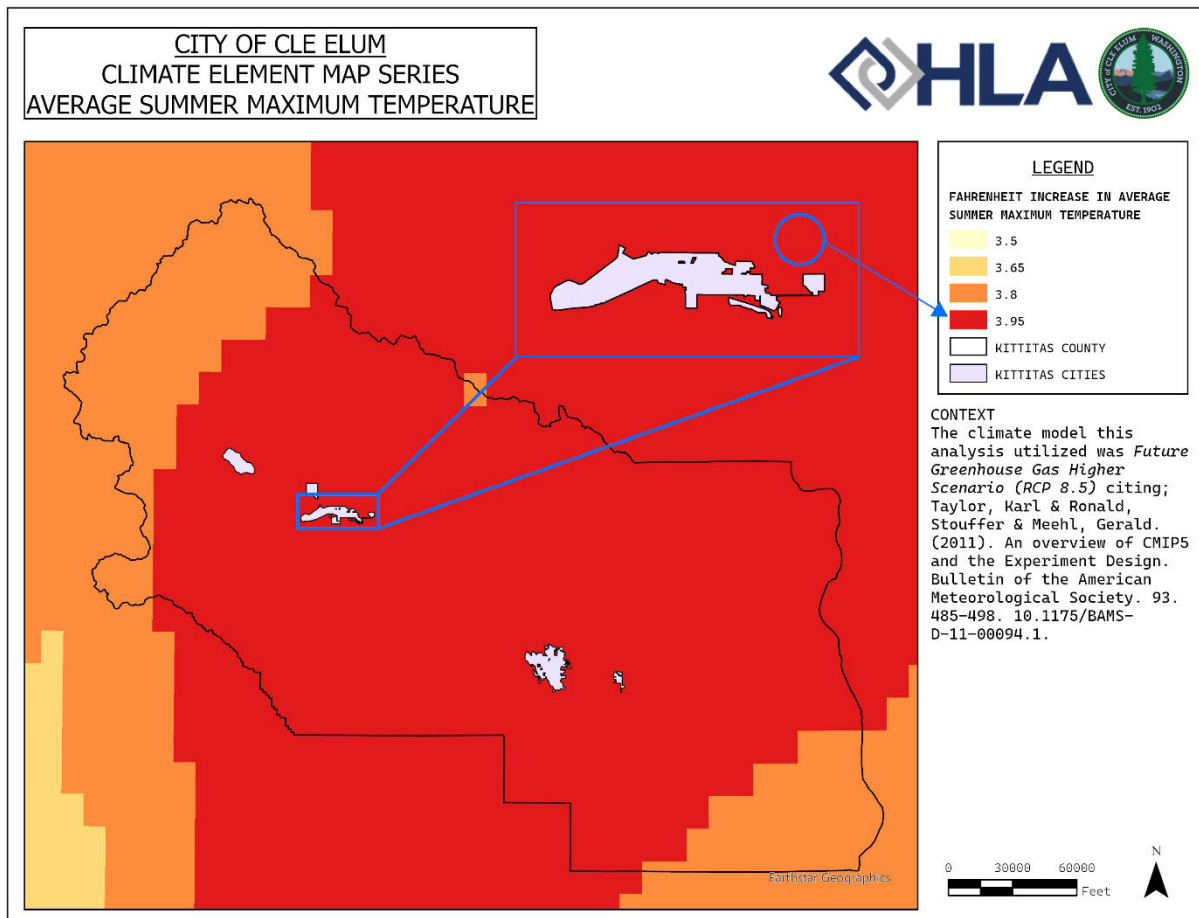

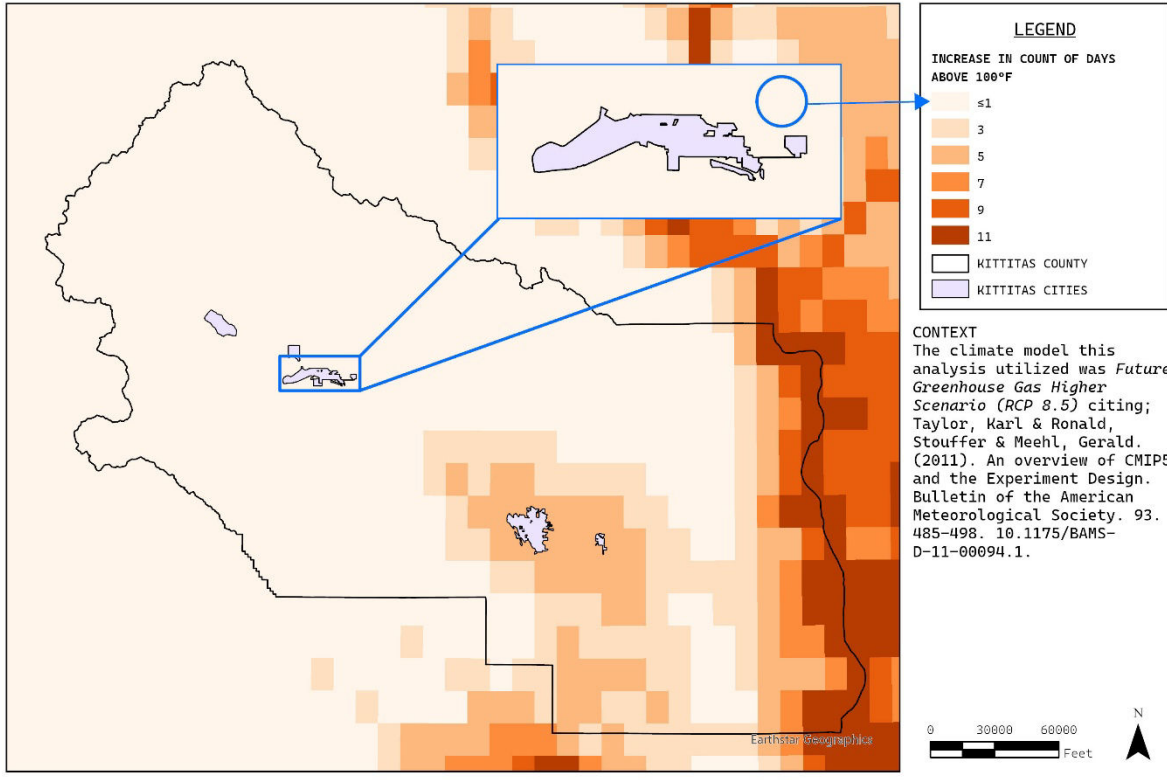

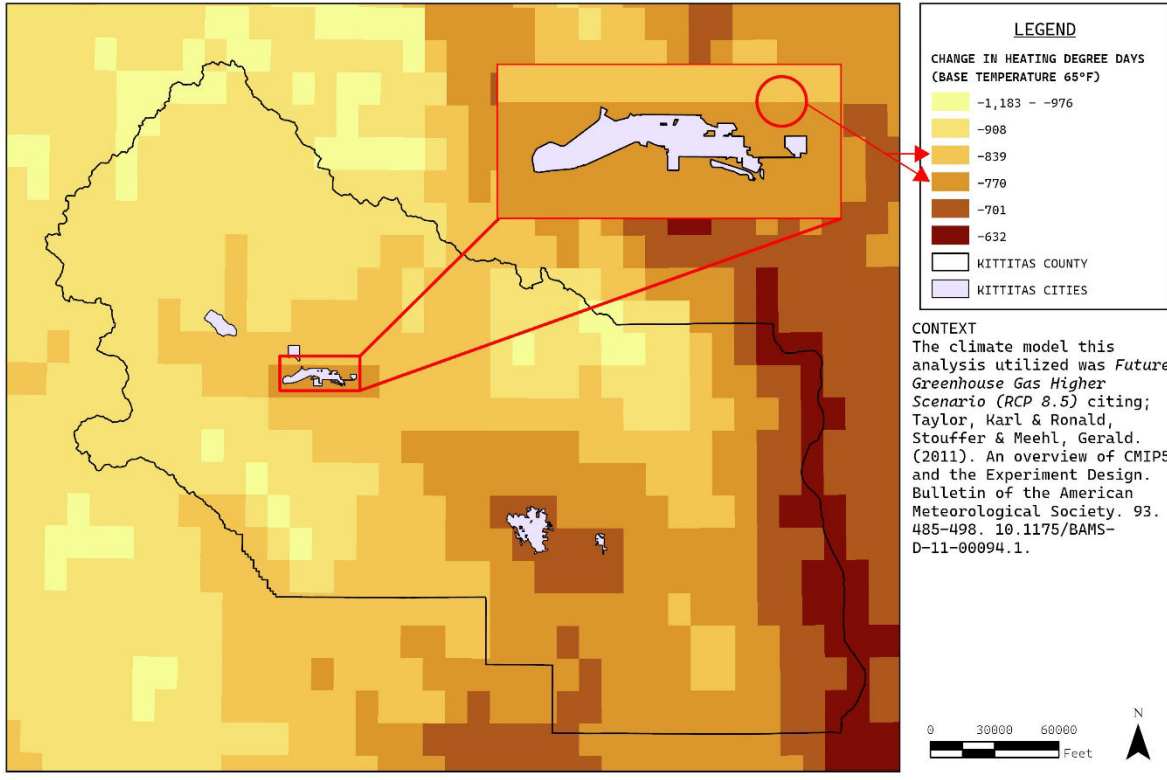

CHANGE IN COOLING DEGREE DAYS



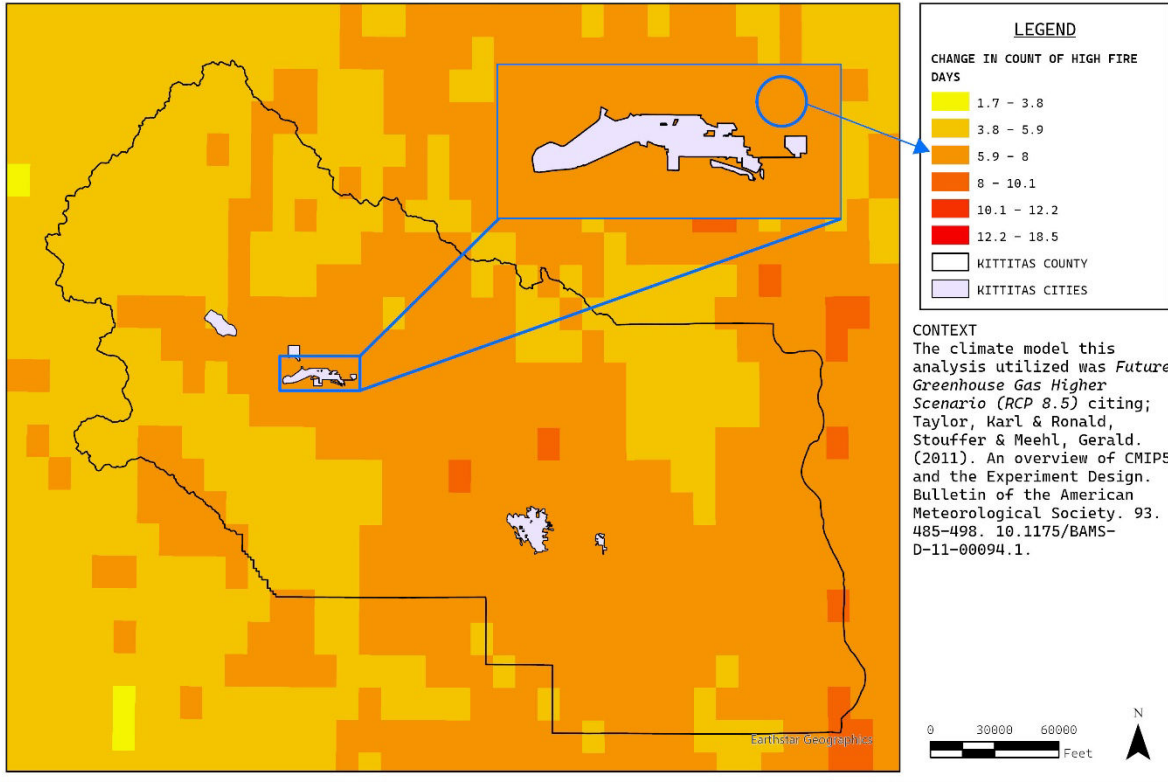

COUNT OF DAYS ABOVE 100°F



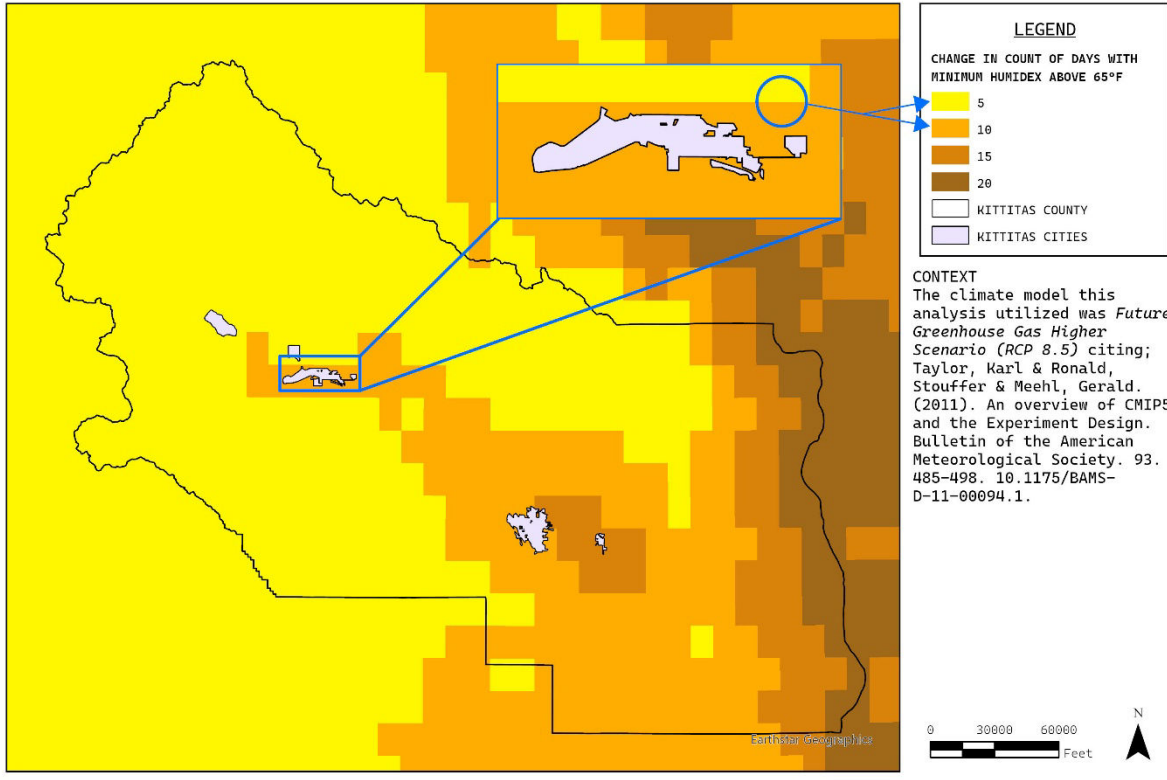

CHANGE HEATING DEGREE DAYS**



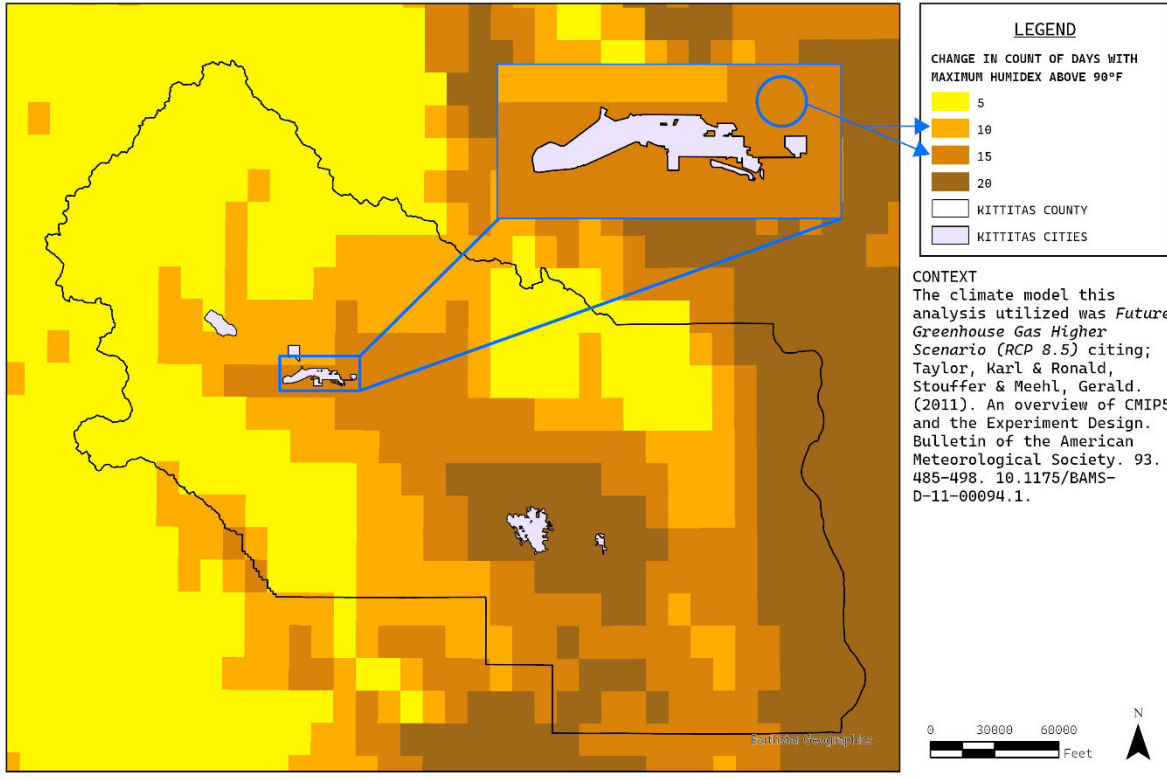

CHANGE IN COUNT OF HIGH FIRE DAYS



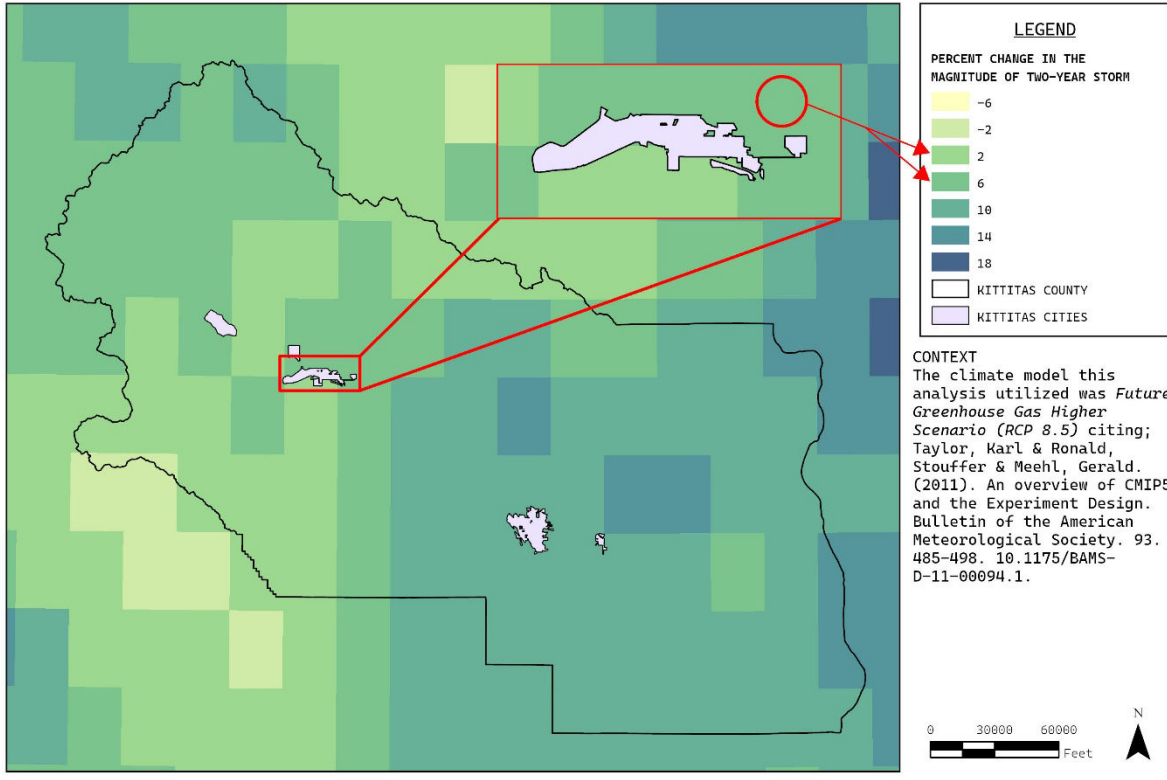

MINIMUM HUMIDEX ABOVE 65°F**



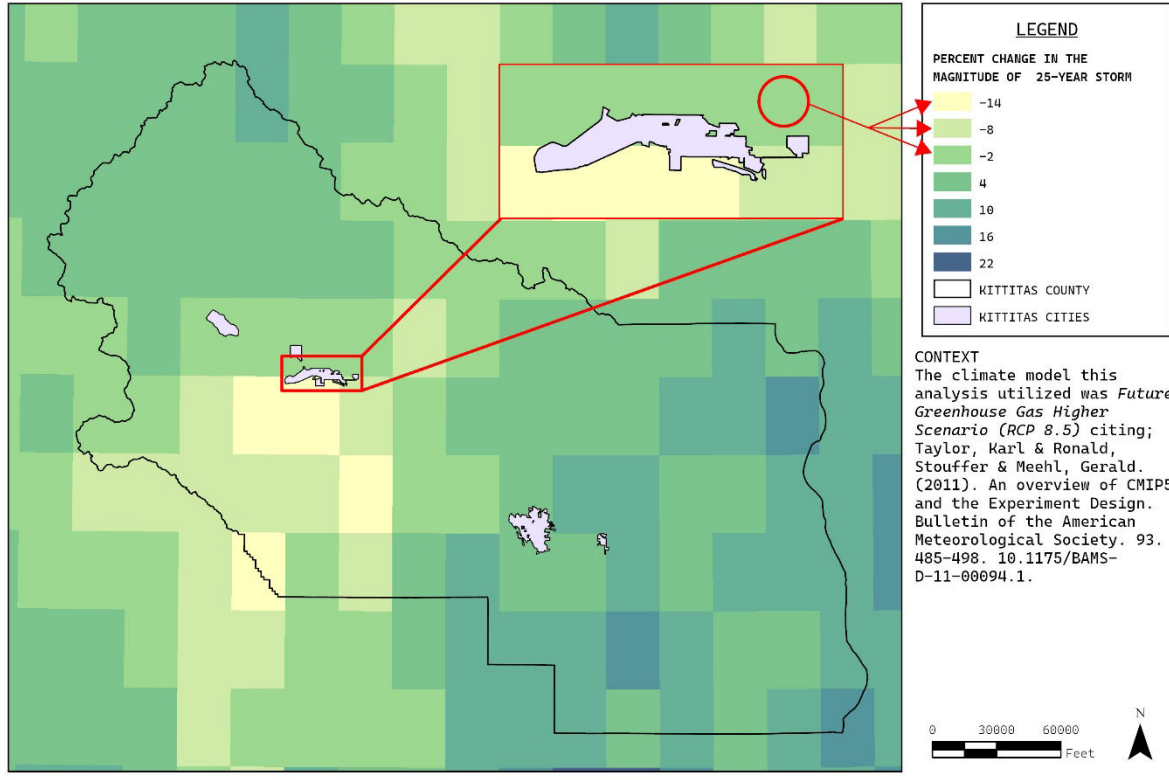

MINIMUM HUMIDEX ABOVE 90°F**



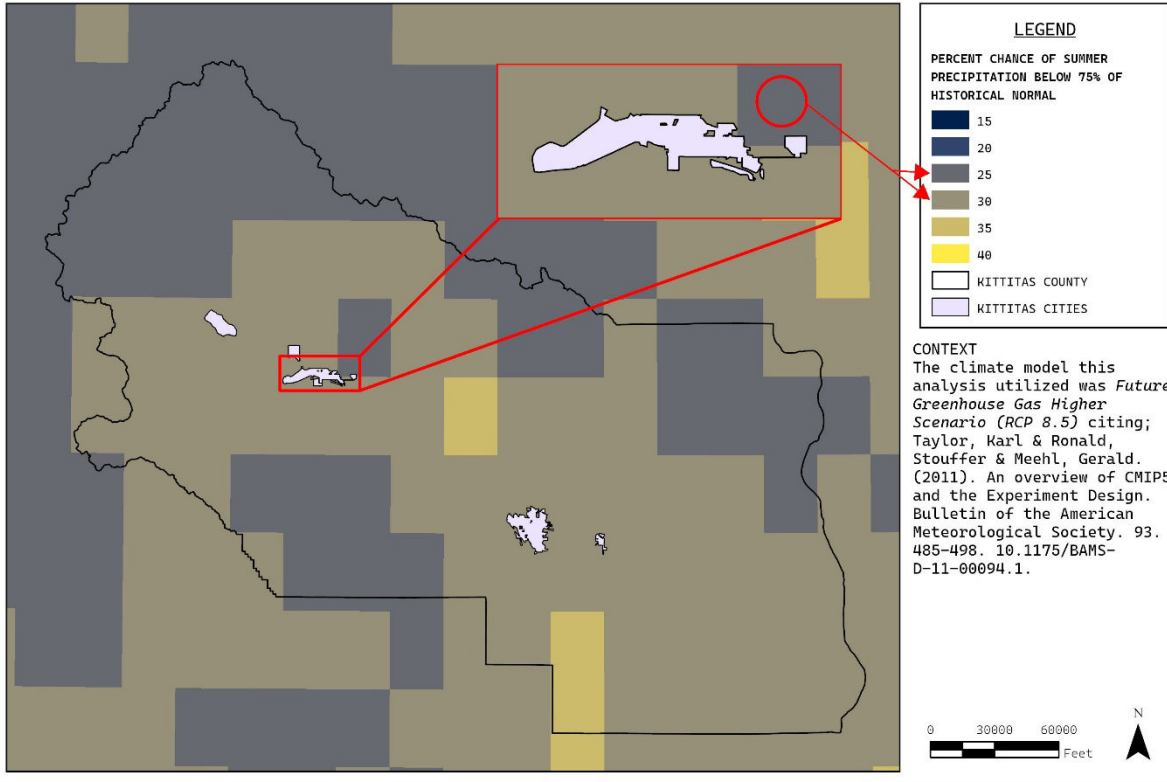

CHANGE IN THE MAGNITUDE OF TWO-YEAR STORM



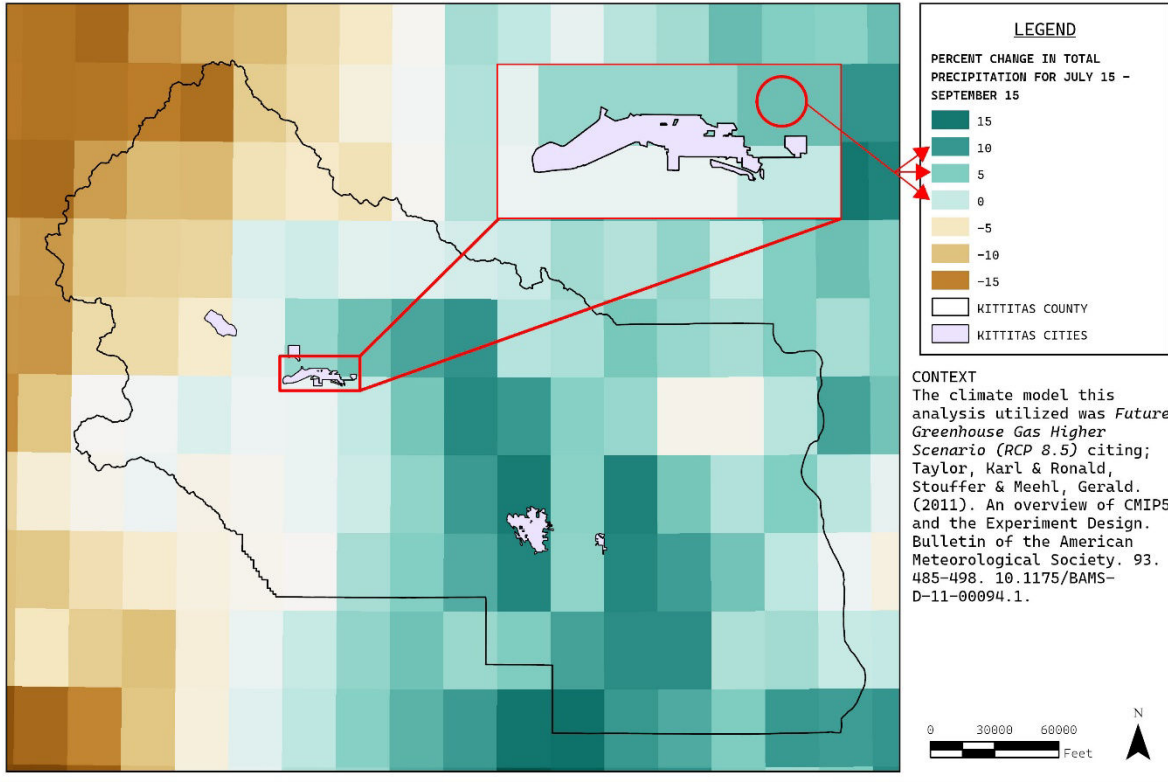

CHANGE IN THE MAGNITUDE OF 25-YEAR STORM



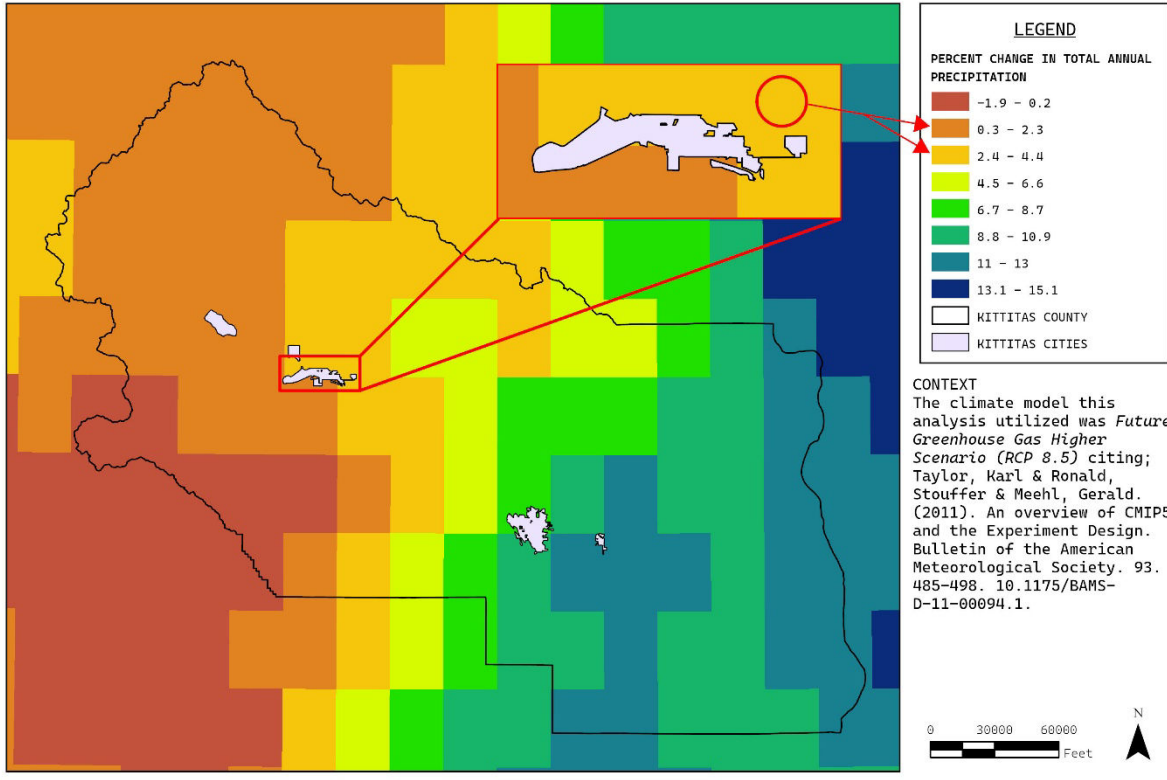

CHANGE OF SUMMER PRECIPITATION



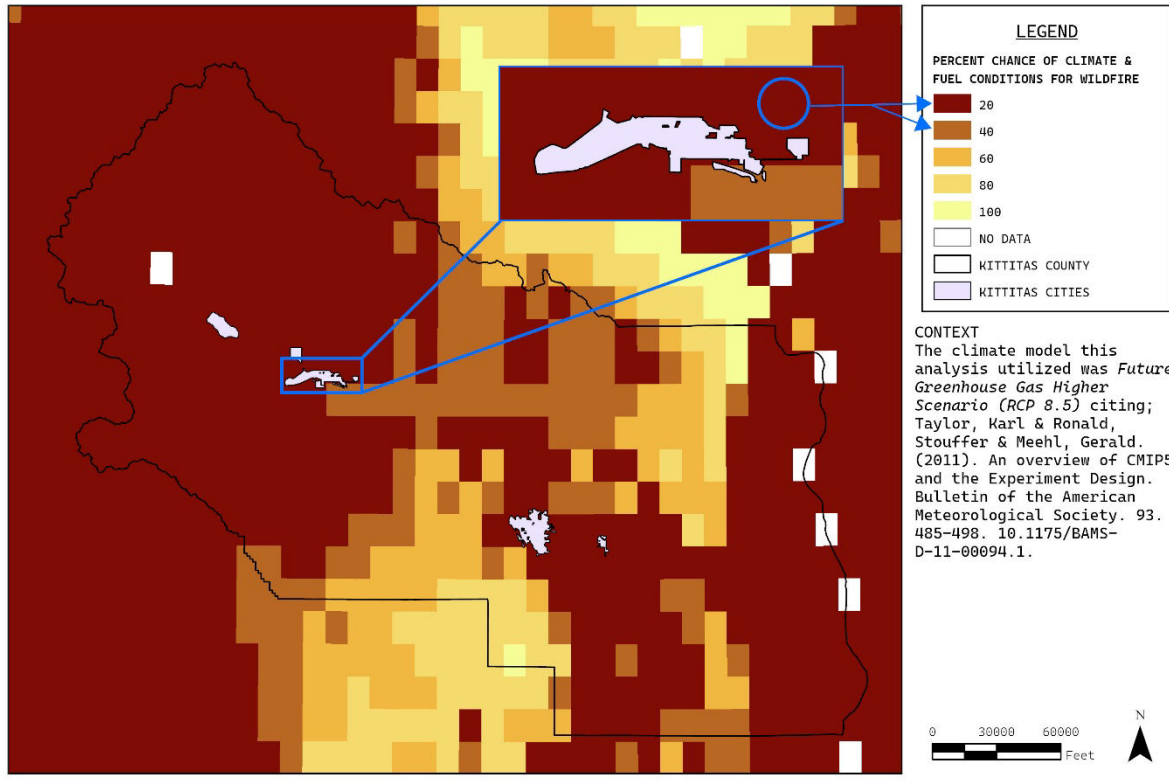
